aul Parker of Owen Sound has shot his age or better more than 30 times but one of the more memorable occasions was last year when he shot 75 (+3) at Sauble Golf and Country Club. He was 83 at the time and was helped by an ace on the fourth hole.

He plays three times a week with his brothers Harry and Ken (Beano) and often times Paul Tindall will take the fourth spot in the group.

He starting playing golf around age 16 and has been a regular player ever since. His handicap has been as low as 8 and is now around 12 and he has won his share of prizes at men's nights and invitationals. He has even won a green jacket - the prize awarded to flight winners at a men's invitational at Saugeen Golf Club.

His best round was a 71 at Owen Sound Golf and Country Club where he was a member for about 35 years. That occurred when the course was only 9 holes and the par over two rounds was 72. The club, now known as Legacy Ridge Golf Club, added a second nine in 1975 and the par is now 71.

Rollercoaster ride in Michigan

Rachael Rier experiences highs and lows during her first year at Davenport University

Rachael Rier is only 19 years old but already she has figured out that the game of golf can be your best friend or your worst enemy, depending on the day.

And that was a good thing as the Hanover resident completed an up-and-down year as a member of the Davenport University women's golf team.

"As we all know, golf can be extremely rewarding or terribly cruel, and my scores reflected this. I shot my worst three-day tournament total in one tournament and set a new 36-hole record in another," she said in an email message to Golf BruceGreySimcoe.

Coming to the Grand Rapids, Michigan

reySimcoe. Rapids, Michigan school as freshman, her first task was to

qualify for tournaments by being top 5 on the team, which she was able to accomplish for all except one.

Her best result came at the University of Missouri-St. Louis (UMSL) Triton Invitational in St. Charles, Missouri, where she carded rounds of 83-79. It was a personal best for 36 holes that vaulted her into 16th place overall in the tournament and made her the top golfer on her team.

She also shot 87-88 and tied for 10th at the ONU Spring Invitational in Saint Anne, Illinois, helping the team to a second place finish.

The results came as a nice reward for all the hard work she put in during the 2017-18 season.

"Being a student athlete definitely kept me busy, but it taught me great time management skills and pushed me to achieve more," she said.

"My days looked something like this; Study hall 7-8:30, Practice 9-11:30, Class 12-5, and workouts in the evening."

Despite the hectic schedule she was able to achieve a 3.95 GPA (Grade Point Average) in her Sports Management program.

She also discovered a few keys to her golf game.

"It was really a learning curve for me. Experiencing these different tournaments and going through swing changes taught me patience more than anything. I've always struggled with the mental aspect of my game, and this year I proved to myself just how important a good mindset is during a round."

"Some days you show up at the course and you can't do anything wrong and you're ecstatic. Other days you're hooking everything and can't make a putt. It's all about learning to be patient with yourself and playing with whatever you brought that day."

"I'm also working on recognizing that golf is just a game, and my past scores don't define me as a player or a person."

This summer she's working and practising at Pike Lake Golf Centre near Mount Forest and probably play-

ing in a few tournaments.

"This will be the first year that I really take it slow in terms

"This will be the first year that I really take it slow in terms of tournaments, and I'm looking forward to spending more time golfing for fun rather than constantly playing competition golf," she said.

But she also plans to work hard both on her game and in the gym so she's ready for the fall season at Davenport.

"My coach is really looking for me to be a leader on the team next year, and I'm hoping to step up and fill the roles of the seniors who graduated this year."

"I truly believe that you get what you work for, and I will continue to put in the extra effort so that I can contribute more to our team's success in the fall."

A week to remember

Legacy Ridge's Sam Evenue gets inside the ropes to caddy at PGA Tour event

am McEvenue experienced one of the best weeks of his life over the winter when he got inside the ropes to caddy for a friend during a PGA Tour event in California.

The Golf Operations Manager at Legacy Ridge Golf Club near Owen Sound was on the bag for Tyler Torano, who like Sam, was making his PGA Tour debut at the Farmers Insurance Open at Torrey Pines Golf Club in January.

Torano, who lives near San Diego in Chula Vista, California, has been friends with McEvenue since they met on a golf course four years ago during one of McEvenue's annual trips to Carlsbad, Calif. to visit his brother and his family.

They had talked about McEvenue caddying for him on the Latinoamerica PGA Tour where Torano played during 2017 but that never worked out.

But it came together in January, starting with Torano going to a pre-qualifier to see if he could make the field for the Monday qualifier for the Farmers event.

With McEvenue on the bag, Torano shot -2 at Carlton Oaks

Golf Club near Santee and advanced to the Monday qualifier at El Camino Country Club near Carlsbad where he shot -5 and finished in the fourth and final spot for the Farmers event

It was a dream come true for Torano but the two friends didn't have time to savour the moment. Instead, they hopped in a car and made the half-hour drive to Torrey Pines to see if they could get in a practice round that day.

They quickly realized it was the big time when they sat down to register for a practice round and right beside them was the #3 ranked golfer in the world - Jon Rahm, fresh off his win in the CareerBuilders Challenge event in La Quinta,

Calif. "That was the first 'wow' moment," McEvenue said.

Then after a few pointers from tour pro Harris English about what you can do during a practice round, they headed to the first tee on the south course. They caught up with South Korean golfer Sangmoon Moon Bae on the third hole and joined him for the rest of the 9-hole round.

Another brush with celebrity came during their Wednesday practice round on the north course when they came across Rickie Fowler doing a photo shoot, which involved him hitting balls into the ocean.

Their round started at 6:20 a.m. on the north course that day and Tyler's playing partner was Australian Aaron Baddeley, who McEvenue described as the "nicest guy we met all week."

When the tournament got under way Thursday, Torano was grouped with Sam Ryder and Rob

Oppenheim. That turned out to be a good thing for McEvenue, who didn't have a ton of caddy experience, and fortunately received lots of help from Oppenheim's caddy, J.J. Beckstrom.

McEvenue was so focused on his job that he didn't have much time to take in the experience of being inside the ropes at a PGA Tour event.

Torano is the kind of golfer who likes to get reassurance from his caddy on reading putts, wind direction, yardage, elevation changes and other decisions so it was a busy and challenging time for McEvenue.

"You're so locked into what you're doing and what your player is doing that you don't really notice the fans around you," he said.

The one exception came during the opening round as Tiger Woods was about to hit his opening tee shot at the event - which marked his official return to the PGA Tour after a one-year break due to injury.

"We were at the 4th hole on the north course when the marshal stopped us because Tiger was about to tee off on the first hole on the south course, which was about 200 or 250 yards away, and he was expecting a lot of noise from the crowd," he said.

"He (Tiger) hit his tee shot way left and you could see a massive crowd swarming around the ball," he said.

After that, McEvenue put his head down and focused on helping his friend have a good first day - something he was able to accomplish with a 73, which put him in contention to make the cut.

The next day Torano, who lives about a half hour south of Torrey Pines, got solid hometown support at the first tee of the south course with loud cheers as he was introduced. "He hit his best tee ball of the week (at the first tee) so that was pretty cool," McEvenue said.

Being followed by family and friends and with larger galleries than the previous day it got pretty exciting, especially when Torano still had a chance to make the cut after making back-to-back birdies on holes 9 and 10.

But the back 9 on the south course is the toughest of the 36 holes at Torrey Pines and Torano bogeyed 11 and 12 and finished with a 74 (+2) and a +3 total. The cut was at -1.

While disappointing, the result showed McEvenue that his friend has the game to play on the tour. "His play proved that he can compete against the world's best and I'm sure it won't be long before he's back on the PGA Tour."

And for McEvenue it was a thrill just to be part of it.

"Growing up as a golf fan, and with the love I have for the game and watching the PGA Tour week in and week out to get to see it from inside the ropes was such a cool experience. But it was also great to do it (caddying) for a such a good friend ... and see him play so well under the pressure."

"It was my best week on the golf course without a golf club in my hand. It was a lot of fun," he said.

He'd love another opportunity to caddy for Tyler and that may come as the California golfer plans to try to Monday qualify for PGA Tour and Web. com events this season.

hile caddying for his friend Tyler Torano at the Farmers Insurance Open was definitely the highlight of his trip to California this winter, Sam McEvenue had another very cool experience - meeting actor Bill Murray.

The chance encounter occurred at Bayonet Golf Club on the Monetery Peninsula after Torano and McEvenue, who was on the bag that day as well, had just finished up a mini-tour event there.

They were headed to the car when they noticed Murray, whose car was parked near theirs. They introduced themselves and asked for a photo.

Murray, one of the stars of the clas-

sic 1980 comedy Caddyshack, introduced himself by saying, "Hi I'm Bill." (as if they didn't know who he was).

There wasn't a whole lot of conversation but McEvenue said Murray was very friendly.

"He was there playing in preparation for the Pebble Beach Pro-Am and I just wished him good luck in the event, McEvenue said. "That was cool. (Meeting) a celebrity golf icon."

In Caddyshack, Murray played Carl the greenskeeper and one of his classic scenes involved Carl pretending he was the "Cinderella Boy" playing in the Masters while lopping off the heads of flowers at Bushwood Golf Club with a weed cutter.

Great start to varsity career

Walkerton's Blake Mackey goes from walk-on to top player on Fanshawe team

t was quite a first season of varsity golf for Walkerton's Blake Mackey.

He wasn't recruited by the golf coach at Fanshawe College and as a walk-on not only made the team but ended up being the school's top player during the regular season.

He shot 74-76 at the tryouts at Sunningdale Golf Club - the Falcons home course - to finish 2nd among those seeking a spot on the team.

Then he shot 70 and tied for third in his first tournament of the season - the Fanshawe Golf Invitational at Firerock Golf Club in Komoka.

"They were a little surprised to see me at the start of the year to come out and put up good numbers right away," he said.

"Normally you see a lot of kids who are walking on being the 8th or 9th members of the team but I believed in myself. I knew I could go to Fanshawe and could perform the way I do all the time. It was nice to go there and put up the numbers I did."

The past champion on the Grey Bruce
Junior Golf Tour followed up his top-3 performance with another tie for 3rd at the
Lakehead Orillia College tournament at
Hawk Ridge Golf Club near Orillia on Sept. 22.

Then three days later the 19-year-old was the individual winner at the Niagara College tourney at Grand Niagara Golf Club.

After that, it was off to the Ontario College Athletic Association Championship at Crimson Ridge Golf Club in Sault Ste. Marie.

Playing in difficult weather conditions, he shot 80-76-84 and finished 12th.

He was 2nd best on his team and was only one stroke away from having a shot at playing in the Canadian University/College Championships.

His team finished fourth, a less-than-satisfying result.

"As a team we weren't overly happy and we all know we need to step up. We're going to be ready for next year," he said.

With 7 of the 10 team members returning, Mackey is excit-

ed about the prospects. Adding to the excitement next year is the fact that Fanshawe is playing host to the OCAA Championship at Firerock.

"Next year is a big year for us," he said. "We're a nice tight group of boys and we all know what we need to do and we're excited about getting it going again."

Among players returning to the team will be Owen Sound's Nick Kazarian, who also made the team as a walk-on and had a tie for 36th at the second tournament of the season - the Georgian Invitational at Heritage Hills Golf Club near Barrie.

Mackey will be returning for his second year in the Golf Management Program and has already decided to take a third year in Business, giving him two more years to play on the golf team.

While very happy with his golf results, Mackey also enjoyed his program.

"It was fantastic. I was really exposed to the golf industry which was great. I had a chance to work alongside Canadian PGA professionals that teach my program as well as superintendents from the area," he said.

Mackey's plans for the summer include working at Walkerton Golf Club again, playing in a qualifier for the Ontario Men's Amateur on May

22 at Rebel Creek Golf Club near Kitchener and competing in Maple Leaf Junior Tour events in August to get ready for his return to Fanshawe.



Provincial events coming to area

Four championships and five qualifiers scheduled for this season

our provincial championships and five qualifiers will be played in the BruceGreySimcoe region this season.

A qualifier for the Ontario Men's Mid-Amateur will be held May 22 at National Pines Golf Club near Barrie, while Blue Mountain Golf and Country Club will play host to a qualifier for the Junior Boys championship on May 31.

Holiday Golf Club sold

But Port Elgin course may continue to operate for a few more years

oliday Golf Club in Port Elgin has been sold to a developer but it may remain in operation for two or three years before the development goes ahead.

Peter Sabbagh, a developer in the Port Elgin area, is looking for someone to run the course while he works on his development plan for the 39-acre property.

"My plans are still up in the air. I have to go through a lot of zoning changes," he said in an interview

While the 18-hole par 3 course is not part of the long-term plans for the property he would really like to see it continue for a few more years.

The course has been managed for the past 16 seasons by John and Susan Stein, who lived in the 100-year-old house on the property.

They have moved out of the house and John has taken a position with the greenskeeping staff at nearby Southampton Golf and Country Club.

The course was owned by John's father, Keith Stein Sr., who signed off on the sale in January.

The course was developed around 1960 by entrepreneur Earl Putnam who three years later also opened Chippewa Golf and Country Club, now known as Southampton G &CC.

Holiday had several owners after Putnam and it was in receivership when Keith Stein Sr. bought it in 1986.

Stein recalls that it was in rough shape at the time he took over.

"The grass on the fairways was up to your knees and about 6 inches deep on the greens," he said. Despite that, he had the course open within 10 days.

He ran the course with his wife for 16 seasons but after she died in a car accident he considered selling it. And that's when John and Susan came forward and offered to operate it.

A 9-hole "Pitch and Putt" golf course was added about 20 years ago but had not been in operation in recent years.

Stein, who previously owned Whispering Hills Golf Club, feels fortunate given the current


state of the golf industry, to have sold the course.

"The way the golf industry is right now I feel like I made an escape," he said.

He said two things worked in his favour: the booming economy in the Port Elgin area and the golf course's location right in town and on a busy main thoroughfare (Hwy. 21).

Stein, at age 79, is happy to retire from his part-time job cutting fairways at his own club. But golf will remain a big part of his life as he continues to enjoy the game at Southampton G & CC where he has been a member for many years.

New clubhouse in works for this year

Praestone Club - the former Orillia Golf and Country Club - underwent major improvements to bunkers, fairways and greens this past year and more upgrades to the facility are planned for this season and beyond.

The new state-of-the-art Maintenance Headquarters and the Pump House were nearing completion at press time.

Work on a new farmhouse-inspired clubhouse is expected to begin this July and the club is hoping to have it ready for occupancy by the summer of 2019. It will sit atop the ridge overlooking the Horseshoe Valley.

A new fleet of E-Z-Go golf carts was to arrive this spring along with additional equipment for the grounds.

The big purchase that should show a significant change in rough conditions is the new rough mower.

They plan to continue drainage projects as well as building and improving both new and old cart paths.

"As you saw a great improvement in all areas of the course these past few years you can be sure that this will continue well into the future," said General Manager/PGA of Canada professional Greg Hickey.


